


Figure 1, The Commander leads the Dessert Meeting

SAFETY CORNER:

BATTERY WIRING CHECKS

It seems like every few years most boaters encounter battery problems. Did you leave the batteries on the boat during winter storage? Did you stash them in the garage? Did you remember to charge them over the winter?

Many times we just top off the batteries and stick them back on the boat during commissioning. Slow down, this is a great time to perform a detailed check of the basic components of your onboard electrical system. These systems have become increasingly complex and require more attention.

First, remember to wear protective gear for eyes and hands when working on or near your batteries.

Here is a quick spring checklist for your batteries and power system. This list doesn't cover everything but it's a <u>starting point</u>.

- 1. Keep top surfaces batteries clean and dry
- 2. Charge or top-off batteries before installation
- 3. Check cables for broken or corroded strands and proper insulation
- 4. Connections should be tight, clean, and sealed
- 5. No spring-dependent connections like alligator clips or clamps
- 6. Avoid push-on or spade-type connections to battery
- 7. Battery compartment should be well ventilated
- 8. Make sure battery compartment is protected against spills
- 9. Check for stray current
- 10. If you must use stranded wire, make sure to solder (tin) the ends
- 11. If battery lines are in conduits, make sure conduits have drain holes
- 12. Attach labels to all lines leading to positive and negative connections

- 13. Protect wires from possible physical damage in exposed areas
- 14. Connections should be easily accessible and above max-bilge water levels
- 15. Check connections on your main switch panel and to the alternator

We are offering Duracell Pro-Cell industrial quality batteries in carton lots at discount. AAA, AA, C, and D size cells are available.

You'll be able to place an order twice each year, one for delivery in April and the other for delivery in late October or early November. Please pay by check and remember the check will not be cashed until we place the full-order. You can collect your cartons at the April monthly meeting. NO-DISCHARGE REMINDER

The Hudson River, from **The Battery** on the end of Manhattan Island to the Federal Dam in **Troy**, which is the entire tidal zone of the Hudson River, has been designated a "no-discharge" area. This, as you all likely know, means the discharge of <u>any</u> boat sewage is strictly prohibited. You may want to refresh your memory regarding the location of pump out facilities along the river. Also check your holding tank and the diverter (Y) valve setting to avoid fines.

Answer: (Dead lights / Port lights).

SHIP TO SHORE RECIPES

Over the past few months we more or less focused on some plates that could be served at any one of our daily meals on board or at the dock. But how can we serve these different types of meals with the limited storage and refrigeration?

"Simple!" Buy one product that can be converted in to different dishes. For example: One 8lb boneless and cooked turkey breast can be used forturkey salad, turkey soup, hot turkey sandwich, turkey tetrazini, turkey dinner, turkey meatloaf, turkey meatballs, in other words out of one 8lb cooked turkey breast, you can feed four people seven different meals while taking up a refrigerated space of 10x6 inches.

This breast should cost you about 16 - 20 dollars, or 60-70 cents per person. If you buy this way you can have the best for very little cost, it has excellent keeping qualities of well over a week.

What I plan to do in our next Fog Horn is to give you a few of the recipes that are mentioned here and then go on to buying and breaking down a canned ham etc. I would like some feed back from you so that I can help you with your boating menu and requirements.
